Winter/ Spring Wildfire Prevention Tips

The recent rainfall and snow seen over the past couple of weeks have somewhat lessened the overall dry conditions experienced over the winter season. However, anticipated moderate to strong, late winter breezes will be evaporating some of that humidity putting us once again at risk of wildfire. High winds and heavy rains have also knocked down a greater than usual amount of tree limbs and branches that provide fuel for fires around your homes. Here are a few tips to help make your property less vulnerable to external fires.

- Clear as much tree debris from your property as possible. Chipping will occur sometime in the early spring so once a definitive date is announced get as many limbs, branches or downed small trees (not to exceed 8 inches in diameter or 10 feet in length) as possible out to the side of the road for disposal.
- Clear late fall leaves and debris from around the house.
- Check your gutters and roof seams for leaves, twigs and pine needles and clear as necessary.
- Do a visual inspection of your roof's shingles to see if any blew off during the high winds.
- If planting new bushes or shrubbery make sure that they are planted far enough away from your home so that the growth won't encroach on the "immediate zone" that is within 5 feet of your home.
- Always keep unnecessary flammable items away from your porches, decks, etc.
- Avoid using your fire pit (even if screened) during high winds or low relative humidity.

We know that leashing our dogs is the law and part of the covenants/Rules in Rivers Edge: "All Household pets of any type, including cats, must be always maintained on a leash and when not on the owner's lot." * Leashing our dogs keeps him or her out of trouble because as well trained as we believe our dogs to be they sometimes lack self-control to keep themselves safe. They run after other animals and find themselves in a situation that can be harmful. They cross and even just stand in the road. Countless dogs are injured and even killed by cars, not to forget encounters with other dogs and wildlife. Drivers do not always see dogs for a multitude of reasons. No one wants to hurt a dog on

purpose, but it happens all over. So, we keep our dogs contained in our yards with a multitude of options from *fences, runners, electric buried fencing systems and even GPS controlled systems. These are all fabulous solutions, and they work beautifully. But what happens when we want to take our dog somewhere and they need the actual leash or harness. We all have purchased a leash or a harness and see them come in a rainbow of colors and patterns. You chose a leash color you like, maybe it is your favorite color. Perhaps your little princess has pink sequins with little crowns. But did you know the color of the leash can tell you something about the dog on that leash? Well, it can.

- **Red:** Indicates a dog that might be reactive or aggressive, meaning you should approach with caution and give them space.
- Orange: Signals that the dog does not get along well with other dogs.
- **Yellow:** Represents a nervous or unpredictable dog, potentially needing extra space or a gentle approach.
- Green: Signifies a friendly dog, open to interaction with other people and animals.
- Blue: Often used to signify a dog in training or a service animal, so avoid distractions.
- White: May indicate a dog with hearing or vision impairments.
- **Purple:** A signal to not feed the dog.

This same color coding can be used just by tying a ribbon on your already existing leash or harness or even a bandana.

While you have your dog out on a walk don't just assume that every dog wants to be approached by every other dog they see. It is very stressful for dogs to greet every dog they see. They need to learn to just walk on by other dogs. It would be stressful for humans to have to interact with every human they see, and we would never get anything done. So, we as responsible humans need to see the leash, harness or bandana and make an educated decision as to whether we want to have our dog interact with others. This will keep every dog and human safe and every outing less stressful for all involved.
